

B.V. Timchenko. Garden Architect

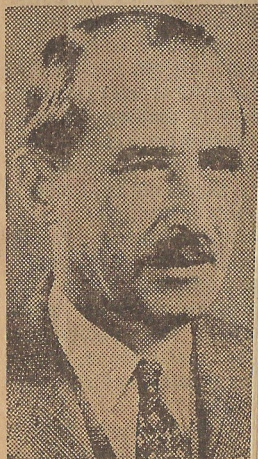
Boris V. Timchenko, 77, a landscape architect here, died Wednesday at Sibley Memorial Hospital after a heart attack.

Mr. Timchenko had long been chief architect of the annual National Capital Flower and Garden Show and designed gardens for the late President John F. Kennedy and Mamie Eisenhower. His firm, formed in 1938, did landscaping for office buildings, department stores, hospitals, schools, motels, housing projects and private homes.

Born in Lipezk, Russia, a town south of Moscow, Mr. Timchenko fought as a cavalry lieutenant in the White Army. He fled to Constantinople, now Istanbul, after the White Army was defeated by Communist forces in 1920. He studied agriculture and landscaping in France and came to Washington in 1926.

Mr. Timchenko was a founder and officer of the Russian Orthodox Church of St. Nicholas, 3500 Massachusetts Ave. NW.

He is survived by a sister, Varvara Sukacev of Washington. She requests that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the landscaping fund of the Russian Orthodox Church of St. Nicholas.
